Knisely Brit Lit

Concept: The sublime in nature and Mary Shelly's Frankenstein

**Objective:** SWBAT write an essay connecting Edmund Burke's essay on the sublime in nature to Mary Shelly's *Frankenstein* 

## **Procedure:**

- 1. Show slide of *Looking Down Yosemite Valley*, *1865* by Albert Bierstadt and lead a classroom discussion while students take notes
  - a. Describe this painting using a few adjectives. Put answers on the board (astonishing, huge, infinite, powerful, vast, beautiful, scary, peaceful...)
  - b. How large would a person seem if he/she was standing in the middle?
  - c. Show pictures of climbers on El Capitan (the <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> dome on the right side of painting).
  - d. How has Bierdstat created an illusion of great distance and depth?
  - e. How does the light add to the drama of the scene?
- 2. Show slide of Barnet Newman's "Vir Heroicis Sublimis" and lead a discussion
  - a. Ask students for their initial reactions to the painting
  - b. Explain the dimensions and how this painting is displayed (this painting is 13 ft long and 7 ft tall as it hangs in a narrow hallway). How would this make you feel if you were looking at it?
  - c. Explain the role of the lines or the "zips" which are strategically placed so that they create a barrier between the vast field of vision and you.
  - d. Explain that with the sublime, you must feel pain in order to feel pleasure because pleasure is an empty feeling. (students add this to their notes)
- 3. Students provide examples of other things in nature (including the American Landscape) that are sublime: the galaxies, the ocean, deserts, the grand canyon, the badlands, the redwoods, Yellowstone...
- 4. Students read Edmund Burke's "The Sublime, the Beautiful, and the Picturesque"
- 5. With a partner students complete a 3+1+illustration that is on a poster sized piece of paper. (3 main ideas + 1 question +1 illustration of an example of the sublime in nature)
- 6. Students share out posters and class answers the questions that are posed
- 7. With their partners, students add an example and a quote from Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein* that connects with the main ideas on their posters
- 8. Share out

Examples: settings in the novel include Mont Blanc, a "sea of ice," the Valley of Chaminoux which all excite a delightful horror for Victor.

An example of a quote from the novel is, "The immense mountains and precipices...that overhung me on every side...spoke of a power mighty as omnipotence." This quote connects with Edmund Burke's philosophy that the sublime is, "...some modification of power..."
