Picturing America School Collaboration Conference April 2010

Course: English (Suitable for grades 9-12)

Objective: Students will determine the effect of setting on an author's writing and will experiment with using setting as a driving force in their own writing.

Artwork Used:

- The Oxbow
- Autumn Landscape—The River of Life
- Looking Down Yosemite Valley
- Cityscape I
- The Dove

Class Time Required: One-two fifty minute class periods

Guiding Question:

How does setting inspire writers?

Background Information:

Students have already studied key aspects of literature, such as theme, point of view, and conflict. The class has read writings that depend heavily on setting (Jack London's "To Build a Fire," Gary Paulsen's *Dogsong* and *Hatchet*; *The Diary of Anne Frank*; *Beowulf*; and others.)

Key Vocabulary:

Setting—time, place, and general background of a work Integral setting—setting that is necessary for a work Backdrop setting—setting that is not necessary for a work

Tasks/Activities:

- Brainstorm ideas for inspiration/human emotion
- Free write about students' favorite places
- Discuss ideas for writings based on favorite places
- Write own ideas for displayed painting

Assessment of Student Understanding:

- Discussion of possible ideas for painting
- One page descriptive writing
